Introduction to an area in Byzantine hymnography that has not been studied in a great extent by modern scholarship. Primarily, we intend to present the hymnographical construction through this particular festal period of the Byzantine calendar. Secondly, we will examine selected hymns and their features.

As a first step, we will examine the historical development of these hymns during the 8th and the 9th centuries, as well as the composition of the services which include them.

In a second stage, we will analyze specific texts by evaluating their poetic and literary features. At last, we will comment these hymns within the context of ritual and worship of the times, without ignoring their public and the public life in Constantinople and Byzantium of the times.

(3) SYLLABUS

The poetical texts in the services of the moveable festal cycle, before and after Easter, are known as the hymns of *Triodion*. The content of those hymns and the ritual of the services are arranged through the ten weeks period of *Triodion*, followed in the festal calendar by the period of *Pentecostarion*. We will study the ideological frame that has created the above textual tradition; at the same time, we will comment on specific hymns for their poetical features, as well as their place in the wider dramatic structure of each service. Main sections of the course will be the following:

- 1. Introduction in hymnography and its development up to the Middle Byzantine period.
- 2. History and formation of the annual worship, the hymns and the services of Triodion.
- 3. Specimens of services from the starting period of Triodion. Main streams of inspiration and their meaning for these times.
- 4. The spiritual background of these hymnographic assemblies.
- 5. Hymns and services of the Lenten period and their development.
- 6. The Hymns of the Holy Week.
- 7. The "construction" of the services, the literary features of specific hymns and different starting-points in their interpretation.
