The general aim of the course is to present to students the art of Description (*Ekphrasis*) in Byzantine literature through selected examples, either as found in texts or as integral texts. The initial theory of *Ekphrasis* will be first presented through the relative chapters of ancient rhetorical manuals such as Hermogenes and Aphthonius, and completed by remarks to which modern bibliography have come upon. - Have a global view of the art of description in Greek.
- Understand the relation between literature and byzantine art and architecture.
- Understand the reception of ancient rhetorical theory in Byzantine literature.
- Correlate representative texts of the Byzantine era with historical events or figures and with ideological and religious development during byzantine period.
