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This seminar aims to put participants in contact with case-texts on strategic theory during the Byzantine period; in particular, texts that partly or in their whole describe the war tactics, as well as areas of knowledge such as: military administration and hierarchy, moves and methods of war in the battle field, technology and weaponry of war, knowledge on the enemy, specific military events about which there are many testimonies about their development in the battle field.

Students after the end of the seminar will get to know the terminology regarding these texts, will be able to identify and analyze their major subjects, as well as to make good use of their knowledge in commenting and interpreting specific passages.

3. COURSE DESCRIPTION

Main structural parts of the seminar will be:

- 1. The discussion on the origins of this specific category of texts, and their relation with the corresponding ones in antiquity.
- 2. The interpretation of the term *Taktika*.
- 3. The detailed discussion on the specific relevant terminology and of its origin.
- 4. The discussion as regarding their main parts and elements, in connection with their content.
- 5. The analysis of exemplary passages on matters such as the military administration, tactics of war,

technology and weaponry of the era, information on the enemy, as well as the action in war times according to the theory in each period.

- 6. The evolution of these texts during the Byzantine era.
- 7. The familiarization with the basic sources that have been transmitted and edited until today.
- 8. The use of the above knowledge in treating specific research subjects.
- 9. The presentation of each subject orally, as well as through a written original essay.
