<p>The general aim of the course is to introduce students to the philosophical epistolography of Seneca (the Younger) and to the discussion and analysis of specific topics and notions regarding both their philosophical content and their narrative technique.</p> <p>After the completion of the course students should be able:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To know the main characteristics and to recognize the literary aspects of the philosophical letters of Seneca. • To know the basic principles, notions and arguments of the Stoic and Epicurean philosophy as they feature in selected letters of Seneca. • To search for and engage with secondary literature in relation to the works which will be discussed and to know the basic scientific requirements of academic writing.

- To organize and share their views and conclusions in the classroom during discussion and in oral presentations.
- To organize and present their thoughts in written exercises and written assignments.
