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The seminar aims to initiate students to the editions techniques of byzantine hagiographical texts. by the accomplishment of the seminar, students should be familiarized with:

- reading a byzantine manuscript, classifying the variations, applying the Text Kritik on the various *lectiones*.
- composing an apparatus criticus and an apparatus fontium.
- Deepening in the theological thought of Sophronius and in his literary technique.
- Understanding the reception of ancient rhetorical theory in Byzantine literature.
- Correlating the works of Sophronius with evidence of the cult of saint Cyrus and John.
